INTRODUCTION:

The United States Soybean Export Council (USSEC) requests proposals to assist in the continued development, implementation and execution of strategies and programs within the Americas Region. For contractors, the expectations are to carry out the deliverables of the activities they are managing and are summarized in associated contracting documentation. Therefore, specific outputs and deliverables for personnel will be included as engagements with key contractors are formalized. Administrative performance will be based on delivering on the terms of those contracts. Contractors are required to provide monthly reports on progress if they are a long-term contractor, or post event reports if they are retained for a specific event. Information from the reports are used to keep stakeholders informed of the progress of their investment.

Through a global network of international offices and strong support in the U.S., USSEC helps build a preference for U.S. soybeans and soybean products, advocate for the use of US soy in feed, aquaculture and human consumption, promote the benefits of soy use through education and connect industry leaders through a robust membership program.

BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE OF THE PROJECT

This proposal will finance contractors to implement the IPRS (In Pond Raceways System) technology of fish production under the highest standards and operating principles that allow to achieve the maximum possible production and in turn meet the objective of increasing audience awareness. objective on the advantages of the system and in turn demonstrate the superior quality of the US soybeans, used in the feeds used under this production system. Also, increase understanding of the value of US soybeans and increase sales growth potential.

The contractor will serve as a specialist in the aquaculture sector and will provide the complete installation and management of the system providing research opportunity to USSEC to promote the use and differentiation of US soy products. Support Aquaculture Utilization and other areas deemed convenient in the Americas region.

PURPOSE OF RFP:

USSEC's standard practice is to RFP for every contract as much as needed in an openly and competitive manner. This type of cost analysis will assist in determining the fair market value for the work to be performed and allows USSEC the opportunity to evaluate various proposals and select the best contractor for the job based on experience, availability, expertise, approach, and cost.

USSEC is looking for a contractor who has significant capacity and / or experience in the aquaculture industry. Experience with soybeans from the US or other produce organizations is a bonus.

The purpose of this RFP is to seek proposals for the construction and assembly of a cost-effective minimum unit of the IPRS system (three rapid circulation channels in concrete and within an onshore pond) under the recommendations of USSEC and its experts, it should be based on the period from October 25, 2021, to August 30, 2022.

BACKGROUND & PURPOSE OF PROJECT:

The Americas Region represents almost 25% of U.S. Soy exports. After China, it is the most important market for U.S. Soy, followed by South East Asia representing 14% of U.S. Soy exports. Unlike other regions, the Americas Region holds the largest market share of U.S. Soy vs competing origins. Due to this large market share, investments in the Americas region have an almost direct impact to U.S. Soy demand. Given the outlook of very tight balance sheets at all origins, the threat of South American imports will be very high in years to come. Promoting the U.S. Soy Advantage in Aquaculture Utilization is a critical part of our quality differentiation strategy. Animal, Aquaculture producers and Feed manufacturers have an estimated growth rate between 3 and 5% per year. This project aims to help the companies enhance their organic growth rates and to differentiate U.S. Soy to gain market share in selected countries.

Latin America has a great potential to growth the fish production and Soy demand through the IPRS Technology which is much more profitable than traditional pond fish culture.

TARGET AUDIENCE:

Universities, industrial associations, government agencies, fish producers, traders and entities related to the aquaculture industry.

SCOPE (SERVICES) OF WORK:

The selected contractor shall promote the use and awareness of U.S. soybeans and soybean products through the following Services:

- Serve as a specialist in the aquaculture sector and will provide the complete construction and management of the IPRS Gold Standard system. This system will provide research opportunities for USSEC to promote its use as well as the aquaculture diets to be used for this system, differentiation of US soy products, support aquaculture utilization and other areas deemed convenient in the Americas region.
- I. RSH will develop a budget that includes the construction and operation of the 3 RWs as well as for the production process of the first cycle of pre-fattening and fattening of the batches of fish that are the object of this project (education as well as research and development).
 - II. RSH will oversee and implement the construction of three rapid circulation channels or raceways (RW) built within an onshore pond that complies with the model and ratio of 1 RW of 220 effective m³ / 10,000 m³ of pond water volume. In the same way, 1 aerator of 2hp should be installed for each RW and another outside in the pond with the same capacity. Finally, the area for depositing the fish feces at the end of the RW must comply with the technical specifications that allow its extraction mechanically by pumping, depositing them in an external settling tank to extract the nutrients and then allow the immediate return of the water to the pond. For the management of fish, the standardization of protocols, principles and practices recommended by specialists must be achieved. Any modification must be consulted with and approved by USSEC before taking place or shared with those in charge of management.
 - III. USSEC will be assured of the experience, abilities, and services from RSH on the terms and under the conditions set forth herein for the purpose of educating and demonstrating the benefits of the In Pond Raceway System (IPRS) to the regional aquaculture industry and as well as the groups of aquaculture technicians that will be attending the training at USSEC's Soy Excellence Center located in Honduras. USSEC members and both stakeholder groups mentioned above will have access to these facilities upon coordination of protocols and agenda agreed with the RSH for a minimum of one visit per quarter and under USSEC budget dedicated for these activities. USSEC requires RSH to facilitate such quarterly visits over the next three years for groups of 20 people at the time. Groups will include USSEC's SEC trainees and/or Zamorano students who will work at the IPRS during periods of at least one (1) continuous week of training.
 - IV. RSH hereby agrees to provide fish fingerlings, feed, labor, services, process and commercialization of the production as well as other resources to educate the public on the importance of the value and utility of using the correct IPRS aquaculture technology through conducting aquaculture research and demonstrations in collaboration and overseen by USSEC under this agreement. This will allow the regional aquaculture industry to understand and experience the best practices for IPRS construction, management, and use, including use of targeted aquaculture feeds using U.S. soy as the primary protein source.
 - V. RSH shall follow the USSEC recommendations generated by Auburn University and its technical specialists. The system to be built and operated should at least generate, in

principle, during the first year of operation, a complete harvest of fish at commercial size, prior coordination and programming with specialists from USSEC and Auburn University.

- VI. Timetable: The project must be developed under the following time estimates, considering a completion date of August 31. In the case of force majeure that prevents the normal development of the works, the parties must, by mutual agreement, establish the necessary changes to this schedule.

- VII. Estimated time for draft improvement and signing of the contract (beginning of works): May 15, 2022
 - a. Time for remodeling-construction of the 1ha earth pond and start of channels construction (it is feasible to develop these two activities in parallel): 2.5 months - August 1, 2022

 - b. Time for completion of buildings and testing of equipment: 0.5 month - August 16, 2022

 - c. Channel planting: week of August 22-26, 2022

 - d. RSH will submit a copy of In-house IPRS training program to be used by SEC trainees and/or Zamorano students visiting the IPRS. This program should also include RSH contributions, and name of RSH coordinator: August 31, 2022.

USSEC will provide the services and travel expenses of technical advisors specialized in IPRS technology from USSEC and Auburn University.

 - All bids for services must provide a breakout of how the fee was derived including but not limited to a breakdown of hourly rate and the amount of effort they anticipate to do the work.
6. Proposals should be no longer than **10 pages** (8 ½" x 11").

We are a dynamic partnership of key stakeholders representing soybean producers, commodity shippers, merchandisers, allied agribusiness and agricultural organizations.

Through a global network of international offices and strong support in the U.S., we help build a preference for U.S. soybeans and soybean products, advocate for the use of soy in feed, aquaculture and human consumption, promote the benefits of soy use through education and connect industry leaders through a robust membership program.

Our 15-member board of directors is comprised of four members from the American Soybean Association (ASA), four members from the United Soybean Board (USB), and seven members representing trade, allied industry, and state organizations.

New board members are seated annually. We are receiving funding from a variety of sources including soy producer checkoff dollars invested by the USB and various state soybean councils; cooperating industry; and the American Soybean Association's investment of cost-share funding provided by the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Foreign Agriculture Service.

The United Soybean Board, created by the 1990 Farm Bill to manage and direct the National Soybean Checkoff, is dedicated to marketing and research for the soybean industry. USB is comprised of 73 volunteer soybean farmers representing the interests of fellow growers nationwide. Each board member is nominated by Qualified State Soybean Boards (QSSBs) and appointed by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture.

Because of the limitations on administrative and salary costs established in the Act, USB outsources the majority of its program management responsibilities to USB's three primary contractors:

- SmithBucklin-St. Louis for domestic marketing, new uses, production research and Board initiative activities;
- Osborn & Barr Communications for communications/public relations activities and;
- U.S. Soybean Export Council (USSEC), Inc. for international marketing and global opportunities activities.

As one of these three primary contractors USSEC may also undertake initiative activities on behalf of USB. USB considers primary contractor staff (approximately 60 people) as core USB staff. These three primary contractors use a number of subcontractors and, together, these entities carry out approximately 450 projects each year for USB. USB also manages approximately 10 subcontractors.
